Spring 2018 Report

More rain, carrying on from a wet winter. However, a few fine days to carry out green's renovations in early September. Greens were verticut prior to vertdraining, sanding and application of gypsum and slow release fertiliser. Greens bounced back well with the Club match play rounds over the last three weeks of the month.

Despite the weather, games played on the course over the 2018 year were again up (+ 8%) on the previous year. Club match play finals were held in early October. An excellent turnout of club members saw keenly contested games over the 36-hole finals for men's and ladies' divisions. In the Junior b division young Morgan Vipond overwhelmed Lew Kerr in the final, and in Junior Men Trevor Harris won over John Kronast. The match of the day was between Ross White and Jock Butler. Ross held off the charging youngster, and on the 36th hole (Par 3) both players found the green with Ross 15 feet away and Jock 6 feet from the hole. The old head calmly slotted the 15-footer downhill put to take the win and deny Jock any chance. In the Intermediate women's division an excitingly even match between Haley Roache and Kris Shove showed 36 holes was not enough to separate them with Kris sinking a great putt to win on the 37th hole. Senior Men_division was contested by Paul Brown and Charlie Hayes, with Paul winning on the 34th. This is a reverse of the result where they played each other 2 years ago.

The piece de resistance for the year was of course the Clubs Centenary weekend, held 2-4 November, 2018. The weekend was a huge success, despite mother nature doing her best to intervene, an enjoyable weekend was had by all. Congratulations to those that managed to snare a prize, but mostly well done to everyone for participating on this historic occasion. The weekend was tremendous reward for all the planning and hard work put in by Club members. Many thanks to all the members that contributed, and especially to all our sponsors.
